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Doing Good: Sowing and Reaping

"Let him who is taught the word share in all good things with him who teaches" (Galatians 6:6).

It cannot be denied that the teaching profession is important for the building of society and the church. Teachers are highly regarded and teaching is considered a noble profession.

Our nation and schools need teachers. We need to pray that God will raise up

many Christian teachers.

The passage in Galatians 6:6-10 refers to a student-teacher relationship. In the church context. this relationship refers to the relationship between the believer and the pastor of the church or the church members and those whom the Lord has called to the fivefold ministry. Paul in

Ephesians 4:11-12 says: "And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." The believers are the students and the ministers of God are called to teach and lead them. Unless this relationship is clearly understood, church splits, strife, a lack of loyalty and commitment will occur in the church.

Galatians 6:6-10 also deals with the responsibility of the student or believer to "do good" to the teacher or pastor. Doing good is an act of sowing. When you give tithes and give towards faith pledges, you are sowing finances.

When you give towards a faith pledge, you are sowing a seed that will germinate and bring forth a harvest. But finance is not the only thing you can sow. You can also sow deeds of kindness and goodness by being gentle, longsuffering, patient, loving and forgiving.

Paul exhorts the believer to share in all good things with him who teaches and to "do good" to all, especially to those who are in the household of faith.

How do you "do good" to the teacher, the one who helps you with your development, your growth and your ministry? Let me suggest five ways you can do it:

Be present when he teaches. Your presence is a great encouragement to

the one who is ministering.
Practise the lesson
taught. Just like the school
teacher who is thrilled when
he finds that all his students did
well in their examinations, those
who minister and teach you in
church will also be greatly overjoyed
and rewarded to hear testimonies of
your victory over trials and
temptations.

Testify to others the truths of the message. Be a witness. Share the good messages you hear each Sunday with those who need God.

Support the teacher. The giving of offerings and tithes is not the only way to do this. You need to pray for the pastors and church leaders. They need "prayer shields" (a term coined by Peter Wagner). Pray that God will anoint them, enable and



Calvary Church Leadership Conference

Leaders challenged to fulfil God's purpose for their generation

When the leaders attending Calvary Church's **Leadership Conference** from 6 to 8 February 2003 heard that our speaker, Dr Alemu Beeftu, was from Ethiopia, many immediately imagined that he must somehow be connected to the Ethiopian eunuch we read about in the book of Acts! Over the three days of the Conference, we sensed Dr Beeftu's passion for developing committed leadership among Christians.

Dr Alemu Beeftu, founder and president of Gospel of Glory, was born on an isolated farm in central Ethiopia, the youngest of ten children. During the 1970s, when the communist government began persecuting the Ethiopian Church, the young Alemu earned both masters and doctoral degrees in the United States and worked diligently to provide leadership for Ethiopian Christians scattered around the world.

On Thursday evening, at the start of the Conference. Senior Pastor Prince Guneratnam thanked the leaders for making the effort to be present. As we prayed and worshipped God together, he encouraged us to leave our careswork and others, behind and to seek the Lord so that we may receive from Jesus during this time we specially set aside.

Dr Alemu Beeftu's first Scripture reference was from Revelation 1:10. He emphasised over and over again that today is the Lord's day and in order to hear what our Lord is saying to us, we need to be in the Spirit. It was as if the Lord was making sure that we would not miss what He was going to say to us over the next few days. We could just sit through another conference or we could "be in the Spirit" and really hear what God wanted us to hear.

God desires that we have an impact on our generation. To do that, Dr Beeftu believes that we as leaders must first accept our calling. Then, we will see ourselves as God sees us and our lifestyles will correspond with our calling. We must accept the roles we are given, as priests, representing people before God and as kings, representing God to people. And we must have the heart of a father for those whom we lead.

Leadership is a relationship. Dr Beeftu used Jesus as an example of relational leadership. Jesus called the disciples to Him. He called them His friends and not His servants. They were with Him, becoming like Him and were later sent by Him to impact the world.

After accepting our calling to Jesus, we must accept our destiny, what God has set for us. Using Joseph as an example, Dr Beeftu pointed out that once we know our destiny, "everyone works for us to push us to our destiny"-whether they may be for us or against us. Our part is to love God, know our calling and God will work all things for good (Romans 8:28).

Sunday, 9 February 2003 was a memorable day for 42 Carpenter's Workshop (CW) children. They were officially welcomed to be a part of the adult congregation.



"Ministry," according to Dr Beeftu, "is not just an activity where we are 'busy' for God. It is total obedience to the revealed will of God." He warned against letting ministry be merely an activity with no impact. "Any activity," he said, "that takes us away from God is never from God."

On Friday evening, at the open session which included those who usually attended the School of Christian Growth and the Prayer Meeting, Dr Beeftu reemphasised that ministry is not about us. We are not to work to impress but to work to impact. We do not have to compete with others when we obey the revealed



will of God. When we realise this, transformation occurs in us and we begin to reflect Jesus in our lives.

God has released His purpose to us and now is the time for us to reach our generation. We need to know God's will for our lives and for those whom we lead. Are we like David who was recorded in Acts 13:36 as one who served God's purpose in his own generation? Do we know

beyond the shadow of a doubt what we were born for? Dr Beeftu reinforced his point by having us all raise our right hands to clasp the "purpose" of God in our fists and then raise our left hands to represent the generation we must reach.

We must have the heart of God and the mind of Christ. Our minds must be renewed and controlled by the Holy Spirit and we must seek God for the revelation of His Word.

On the final morning of the Conference held at the Corus Hotel, referring to the account of Moses and the burning bush (Exodus 3:1-5), Dr Beeftu spoke of the need for a paradigm shift. This involves a letting go/dropping of things first before we can pick up anything else. Moses left the pleasure of Egypt. In Hebrews 11:24-26, Moses let go of his social status when he refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter. He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God, letting go of the privilege of pleasures of a luxurious lifestyle.

He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ greater than the treasures of Egypt because he was looking to his Senior Pastor Prince Guneratnam speaking to the leaders at the final session reward. Moses took off his shoes. He let go of the past—that of failure, fear, disappointment, rejection, the 40 years of life in the wilderness. Moses dropped his staff (Exodus 4:2-3)—his support, that which he used for self-protection, for leading his sheep. According to Dr Beeftu, it simply meant the season for using ministry is over. Ministry cannot be used to defend you. The old style of leadership is over.

Unless we let go like Moses, God cannot do much. Once we have let go, then we can pick up a new vision—the ability to see God, to see what God sees and to see as God sees it. We can respond to a change with a renewed purpose and we will be willing to accept a new power, anointing and authority. We will receive new strategy, a new pattern and a new passion.

Dr Beeftu concluded his sessions with us with a reminder to us to accept our calling and to serve with the Holy Spirit's anointing in order to fulfil the purpose of God for our generation with impact. We must keep the fire burning (Leviticus 6:12)!

After a good lunch, we were back for the final session with Senior Pastor. He remarked that people do not like changes. He asked some thought-provoking questions such as, "When was the last time you did something

for the first time?" and "Are you ready for a change if you are going to fulfil God's call?"
Using John Maxwell's material on "The Challenge of Change", he highlighted observations about the causes and results of change, the challenges faced, what leaders

need to do at such times and how to handle the transitions that accompany change.

Throughout the Conference, there was a sense that God is leading Calvary Church to something new. All messages at this Conference were timely. Senior Pastor concluded the Conference by reminding us to ask God for grace as He leads us to yet another level of faith.

16 Foundational Truths Series

Water Baptism and Communion: Two ordinances, three tenses

"The ordinance of baptism by immersion is commanded by the Scriptures. All who repent and believe on Christ as Savior and Lord are to be baptized. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Christ and that they also have been raised with Him to walk in newness of life."

"The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements—bread and the fruit of the vine—is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Peter 1:4), a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Corinthians 11:26) and a prophecy of His second coming (1 Corinthians 11:26) and is enjoined on all believers "till He come!"

Biblical Christianity is surprisingly simple. When distilled to its essence, the teachings of Jesus involve virtually none of the ceremonies, rituals or other features usually associated with religions. Yet Jesus did leave us with ordinances, concrete ways of connecting with His person and with other believers. Water baptism and Communion are the two ordinances practiced by the Assemblies of God. Neither makes us a Christian, but both tell us what it means to be

Water baptism: buried and raised with Christ

While Jesus himself did not baptize anyone, He immediately delegated this responsibility to His followers (John 4:2) who continued the practice under His direction (Mathew 28:19) as a way of initiating new believers into the faith (Acts 2:41). For 2,000 years followers of Jesus have made three powerful statements in the act of water baptism—one past, one present and one future.

Past tense: I have chosen. At various times in history, misguided Christians have attempted to coerce others into baptism as a way of forcing them into their religion. These campaigns hardly accomplished Jesus' original mission for the church to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19, NIV). Obviously, being a "disciple" is meant to come first, and that by free choice. An Ethiopian who came to faith by way of Philip's witness asked him, "Look, here is water. Why shouldn't I be baptized?" (Acts 8:36).

This is the attitude that baptism represents: a desire to announce that I have chosen to follow Christ. The Assemblies of God endorses water baptism of those believers who are old enough to understand the experience. Understanding is needed in order to fulfill the biblical emphasis on voluntary choice and saving faith.

Present tense: I can identify. Baptism is a way of telling the world that I identify with Jesus in every respect. When a believer enters the water, he or she is being "buried with [Christ] in baptism and raised with him through your faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead" (Colossians 2:12). In this sense, every baptism is a funeral for the old self, a way of saying

that sin and death no longer own me, "because anyone who has died has been freed from sin" (Romans 6:6,7). But it is much more. The grave could not hold Jesus any more

than the water can hold us. At Christ's return, the grave will be unable to hold us as well (Romans 8:11).


Christ's death and resurrection are the great universals of the Christian faith, accessible to anyone who believes. Despite some differences in theology and method, all Christian traditions practice water baptism in some form, telling the world that their faith is not a set of beliefs, but a life lived out in Christ. The Assemblies of God practices water baptism by immersion to reinforce the symbolism of burial and resurrection and to reflect the practice as found in the New Testament.

Future tense: I will be faithful. Scripture records baptisms taking place in public settings. Since church buildings were not used until the third century A.D., the public nature of the ordinance most likely persisted for generations. Thus, to be baptized as a Christian in a largely pagan culture was to make a very public statement of total commitment to Christ, and to face the

consequences of that commitment.

Public baptism makes it impossible for Christians to practice a "secret" faith concealed from a possibly hostile world. A baptismal service, especially when accompanied by the new believer's retelling of his or her spiritual journey, is a powerful witness to the risen Christ and a statement of commitment to the Savior that cannot be retracted. It is a way of saying that I have counted the cost and decided to serve God with all my heart (Luke 14:25-33).

historic Christian practice of baptizing "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). In addition to being Jesus' only instruction on the matter, this wording reflects the triune God's total commitment to the believer. The Father's love sent the Son to the cross. The Father and the Son sent the Spirit upon the church (Matthew 3:11; John 15:26).

In his Easter message, Senior Pastor Prince Guneratnam used the example of Mary Magdalene to exhort us to allow gratitude to

Jesus to make us His faithful and loyal followers, always supportive of His work. He challenged us to "do something for the risen Lord".

sharing the



Communion: the Lord's table

Some Christian traditions refer to Communion as the "Eucharist," however, the wording used is much less important than the recognition that "the Lord's supper" (1 Corinthians 11:20) takes place at "the Lord's table" (1 Corinthians 10:21). The original language here is quite emphatic; this experience belongs to God.

Jesus modeled the Communion moment at a Passover meal that would eventually be called the Last Supper (Matthew 26:26-28). The common label is incorrect. This was really the first supper, the beginning of two millennia of believers celebrating Christ's presence among them. Three truths present themselves every time we meet with the Lord around His table.

Past tense: a table of history. The Lord's table recognizes the historical reality of Jesus' sacrifice. Of the bread, Jesus said, "This is My body which is broken for you." Of the cup, He said, "This cup is the new covenant in My blood" (1 Corinthians 11:24,25, NKJV). Rather than being a hollow ritual about Christ, the Lord's Supper commemorates what He has actually done for our forgiveness and reconciliation with the Father.

In water baptism, we individually identify with Christ's death and resurrection. But at the Lord's table, the entire community focuses on the Cross and the empty tomb. In this act, the history of redemption is affirmed by the congregation, and the congregation is affirmed by the Agent of that history. As Jesus said, "Do this in remembrance of Me" (1 Corinthians 11:24,25). Assemblies of God churches serve Communion frequently in order to bond the congregation together around the central reality of Christianity: the Cross.

Present tense: a table of accountability. One purpose of the Communion experience is to call participants to a moment of accountability before the Lord. Paul addressed the church at Corinth on this issue. The congregation was fractured by competing loyalties and was displaying grotesque moral and relational failures. Even the regular fellowship meals, and the following

Communion services, were coming to resemble the feasts held in local pagan temples (1 Corinthians 11:18-22).

The Corinthians needed to "examine" themselves: "For anyone who eats and drinks without recognizing the body of the Lord eats and drinks judgment on himself" (1 Corinthians 11:29, NIV). This injunction means that the blessing of Communion is not only neutralized, but reversed, when the Lord's table (and the sacrifice and community it represents) is treated with disrespect. There is no benefit in the bread and cup for Christians who choose to live in flagrant disobedience before coming to the table.

Assemblies of God churches tend to take a sober attitude while serving Communion, providing opportunity for members to consider the quality of their lives and make things right with God and with others.

Future tense: a table of prophecy. Communion is temporary. One day the ordinance will be replaced permanently by fellowship among Christ and His people in eternity (Revelation 19:9). Jesus spoke of this when He told the Twelve at their final Passover meal, "I will not drink of this fruit of the vine from now on until that day when I drink it anew with you in my Father's kingdom" (Matthew 26:29).

Every time the church celebrates Communion, then, we "proclaim the Lord's death until He comes" (1 Corinthians 11:26). Coming to the Lord's table is a way of recognizing that the future will not be an endless extension of the present. Christ is coming for His church. The bread and the cup foreshadow the real Last Supper, the one that will never end.

Ordinances are visible representations of invisible realities. We are water baptized to signify our entry into the kingdom of God through identification with Christ in His death and resurrection. We come to the Lord's table to remember the present reality of the Cross, to make our lives accountable to God, and to look forward to Christ's return. As we participate in the ordinances, we connect both to God and to His people.

encourage them. You may hear negative things being said about them. Do you pray for them and ask God to encourage them to press on serving? Or do you pick up the telephone and ask your friends, "Have you heard the latest?" Your pastors and teachers need your prayers.

Bring others with you to learn and be blessed like you. As you are blessed at each meeting and your needs are met, invite those who also need such blessings to the meeting. Everyone has a God-given ministry. Everyone should be involved and committed to doing something for the kingdom of God because "God has appointed these in the church: first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healing, helps, administrations, varieties of tongues" (1 Corinthians 12:28).

Why "do good" to the teacher? There are two very strong reasons:

Firstly, you "do good" to the teacher because God cannot be mocked. Galatians 6:7 says: "Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, that he will also reap." Do not be deceived, led astray into thinking that you can take what God says lightly or find fault with what God has said. The Scripture declares clearly that a man will sow what he reaps. It is an immutable law.

If you sow, you will reap. You will reap what you sow. If you sow lies, you will be lied to. If you cheat, someone will cheat you. If you are kind, gentle and loving, the law of sowing and reaping says you will reap the same. You will reap more than what you sow. When the seed you sow grows into a big tree, it will

bear fruit and you will have many more seeds. Sowing has to do with giving. When you give to God, it will come back overflowing. You cannot out-give God. But if you sow bad deeds, you will reap bad deeds in abundance.

Whatever you sow towards your teacher, you reap. You will

bear the judgement of your behaviour. For example, if you do not learn and practise the truths taught about the lust of the flesh, you will be overtaken by the flesh. You will seek worldly possessions, position

and power, strive against others, behave immorally and become a slave to your desires. The way of the flesh is death. "For to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Romans 8:6).

However, if you learn and practise the truths taught, God's life is in you. "For he who sows to the flesh will reap corruption, but he who sows to the Spirit will of the Spirit reap everlasting life" (Galatians 6:8). The fruit of the Spirit is "love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness [and] self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). If you need love, sow love. If you need forgiveness, forgive. Do to others what you want others to do to you (Matthew 7:12).

Secondly, you "do good" to the teacher because you will reap in due season. Galatians 6:9 says: "And let us not grow weary in doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart." The student and the teacher will both reap when the time comes.

Sowing is hard work. You can get weary. You can be tempted to give up when you see more tempting alternatives. You can give in to pressure because of persecution and criticism.

But sowers, do not be discouraged because you will reap in due season. The Bible in 1 Corinthians 15:58 exhorts:

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

Continue in the things that you have learned. Do not be weakened in your commitment and dedication. "But you must continue in the things that you have learned and been assured of, knowing from whom you have learned them" (2 Timothy 3:14).


Guard your minds. Reject all negative thoughts about giving up. Do not allow your mind to think in the flesh or like the world. The Bible in 1 Peter 1:13 says: "Therefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and rest your hope fully upon the grace that is to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ."

When do you "do good" to the teacher? At every opportunity! "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all, especially to those who are in the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10). We are living in opportune times. Take advantage of the opportunities to do good-to a hurting family member, neighbour, colleague. Sow deeds of kindness to members of the church family, the household of faith, which includes your teachers and also to unbelievers. The Bible in Hebrews 13:16 says: "But do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices, God is well pleased." However, take heed of James 4:17: "Therefore, to him who knows to do good and does not do it, to him it is sin."

Be a sowing Christian. You can sow not only in finances but in deeds as well. Sow towards your teachers. Sow towards those in the household of faith. Sow towards the unbelievers and you will reap God's blessings. "Trust in the Lord, and do good; dwell in the land and feed on His faithfulness" (Psalm 37:3).
